Envirothon Wildlife study tips: (There are a lot of books that can be referenced for all the following as well as web sites that have almost endless information on all this)

- Know the acts of congress that shape wildlife management today. Examples are migratory bird treaty act, Dingell-Johnson act, Pittman-Robertson act, National Wildlife Refuge Act, etc.
- 2. Understand the basics behind the Voyageurs Wolf Project, including research that has come from the study, names of the 16 wolf packs and methods of collecting data.
- 3. Birds: Be familiar with the migration pattern around Hawk Ridge, the International Bird Institute's MAPS banding and basic ways to identify a bird species in the field (call, flight pattern, plumage patterns, etc.)
- 4. Know the family for each species below (ex. Canidae, Sciuridae, etc.)
- 5. Be able to identify tracks and strides of each species below
- 6. Be able to identify the following list of animals that occur in MN, know general life habits and general wildlife terms.
